private collections including the National Museum of Australia. As a proud descendant of Manalargenna, Chief of the Cape Portland tribe, Judith's often brightly coloured and highly textured paintings draw deeply on her Aboriginal heritage while reflecting on the contemporary world in which Aboriginal people exist today.

These workshops explore the ideas, beliefs and techniques behind the artist's *Symbolic Landscapes* series, which is inspired by Tasmanian Aboriginal petroglyphs or rock carvings. Involves discussion and hands-on art making.
