Teachers' notes

This photography project has been developed by the Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery (TMAG) to encourage students to engage with landscape, experiment with photography and to share their artwork. All Year 7-10 students (13 years of age and over) in Tasmanian schools are eligible to participate.

It is free and easy!

The theme of this project is: landscape photographs that focus on Tasmanian rivers and waterways.

Students are invited to upload their best landscape photographs of Tasmanian waterways to Instagram, tagging them **#derwentTMAG**. As well as sharing them on Instagram, students' photographs will be screened at the Tasmanian Museum and Art Gallery during *The Derwent*.

The Hydro Tasmania *The Derwent* Photography Project has been aligned with the Australian Curriculum (Visual Arts) for Years 7-10, specifically:

Band Description for Years 7-8 includes:

- exhibit artworks individually or collaboratively, basing the selection on a concept or theme.
- reflect on the 'cause and effect' of time period, artists and art styles influencing later artists and their artworks.
- learn that over time there has been further development of techniques used in tradition and contemporary styles as they explore different forms in visual arts.
- develop their understanding of the roles of artists and audiences.

Band Description for Years 9-10 includes:

- refine personal aesthetic through working and responding perceptively and conceptually as an artist, craftsperson, designer or audience.
- reflect on the development of different traditional and contemporary styles and how artists can be identified through the style of their artworks as they explore different forms in visual arts.
- use historical and conceptual explanations to critically reflect on the contribution of visual arts practitioners as they make and respond to visual artworks.¹
